# Victorian Baptists

Victorian Baptists are a movement of people on mission to advance the Kingdom of God. We are grassroots people, with a particular emphasis on the local church.

Our local churches are self-governing and self-supporting, ranging in size from twenty or so members to several thousand. Although each Baptist church is an autonomous entity, Baptists nonetheless have always believed in associating with one another - and so churches come together in regional, state, national and international spheres to promote and support the fellowship and mission of Baptists everywhere.

Our Baptist Union of Victoria is made up of 223 churches of various sizes in all corners of our state. These churches are Constituent Members of our Baptist Union served and supported by our Union Council, Baptist Union of Victoria Office and Agencies.

#### Message from Union Council Chairman

One of the great privileges of serving as a member of your Union Council is in hearing about some of the wonderful things that God is doing through His people in the churches and agencies of our BUV. As Union Council has met during the last year we have heard from the Senior Staff of our BUV Office and also from representatives from some of the Agencies of the BUV.

Union Council is a group of up to nine people elected and entrusted by the Assembly of the BUV to oversee the governance of the Baptist Union of Victoria.

During 2014 two long standing members of Union Council concluded their terms of service. Stephen Morton completed 20 years as the BUV's Honorary Legal Advisor and Philip Trebilcock concluded eight years of service including being President of the Union. Both Stephen and Philip served as Chairman of Union Council or its predecessor Executive Council as well as chairing the search committees leading to the appointment of Alan Marr (Stephen) and Daniel Bullock (Philip).

In May 2014 Simon Holt was elected to Union Council until October 2015 to fill the vacancy caused by Frank Rees' resignation, and in October 2014 Darryl Kilker was elected and Trevor Spicer re-elected to Union Council for three year terms. At the October 2014 gathering Jame Lewis from the Aberfeldie Church was elected as the Union's Honorary Legal Advisor.

During the year it has been the privilege of your Union Council to receive and approve applications from four groups to become recognised Faith Communities of the BUV and eleven groups seeking to be Constituent Member Churches. It is encouraging to see growth within our Union of Churches.

As Chair of Union Council I am grateful for the continued support and contributions of Council members, elected to represent the churches of our Union. I pay tribute to their combined efforts to discern, deliberate, conceive, create, envision and engage in moving us all forward in association. It is not always and easy role, but I share the conviction of every member of our Union Council and BUV Leadership Team, that we truly are 'Better Together'.

### **BUV Director of Mission & Ministries Report**

I have the great privilege of engaging with church leaders in my travels throughout Victoria and witnessing first-hand the amazing work of our churches and agencies as they seek to advance the Kingdom of God in their context. Every church community and church leader I engaged with during 2014 expressed their desire to connect with their community in order to bring hope, transformation and ultimately introduce people to Jesus. Whilst there is a great diversity within our Union and we might not agree on every issue, what was evident to me through my interactions, is that Victorian Baptists are a passionate people who love Jesus, desire to follow Him faithfully, live in sync with the Word of God and are actively engaged in mission.

During 2014 we introduced the concept of Consultation Forums in order to workshop issues we would bring to our Delegates Dinner discussions. The forums provided the opportunity for church members, delegates and leaders to listen and connect with one another in a smaller and less structured environment to Delegates Dinners, and also to engage with me directly in a more intimate context. We ran 8 forums in the following locations: Sydenham, Wodonga, Diamond Valley, Rowville, Freeway, Traralgon, Barrabool Hills and Mitcham, where we examined the issues of: Better Together for Mission, Mission and Spiritual Vitality, Affordable Housing and the mission of God, and Churches understanding and supporting people with mental illness. The feedback and insights gained helped form the basis of our discussions and the shaping of resolutions for our Delegates Dinners. Consultation Forums will continue to be developed.

In June I accompanied a group of BUV pastoral leaders on a study trip to the UK to look at innovative mission. What we discovered was that while the Church in the UK has been in decline for many years, Baptists, among others, are being proactive in addressing this decline through pioneering initiatives. We looked at many models of mission and church, and as a result came home convinced that, in order to reach people we have never reached before, we need to do things we have never done before. This trip has been instrumental in shaping our 2015 vision around innovating pioneering mission.

We continued to work alongside and develop strong partnerships with our agencies throughout 2014. Our strategic alignment meetings where all the heads of agencies come together including: Baptcare, Whitley College, Global Interaction, Baptist Camping, Baptist World Aid, Baptist Financial Services, Baptist Insurance Services and our 3 Baptist schools – Carey, Strathcona and Kilvington, have helped to strengthen the connectedness and cooperation among our agencies.

Our Ordination Program is going from strength to strength with 13 people being ordained in 2014, resulting in the need for two ordination services. We had 35 candidates in the ordination cohort and many more enquiring about ordination. 2015 is also shaping up to be a strong year in this area.

It is my desire that through the pages of this report and through the strengthening engagement of churches with our BUV Office, we will be reminded of our positive progress towards investing in outward-focused and mission-mobilised Baptist churches in Victoria. We will continue to facilitate this by focusing on equipping and empowering our Victorian Baptist leaders.

I would like to thank our Union Council for their confidence in, and support of our BUV Leadership Team. I also thank and acknowledge the high-quality work and commitment of our BUV staff team. Can I encourage our churches, pastors and leaders to continue this journey with us as together we seek to advance God's Kingdom here in Victoria.

Commenced research into *Understandings of Mission amongst* our *Burmese congregations* with a view to assisting them in training their second generation leaders for mission and outreach in Australia.



## for Pastoral Leaders

Our Pastoral Leadership Team in 2014 invested prayer, personnel, passion and professional expertise in supporting BUV Pastoral Leaders to:

- deal with complex expectations
- provide fresh, visionary, missional leadership
- share and carry the deep pain and dysfunctions of people
- manage the complicated voluntary community organisation that is the church
- prioritise limited resources
- meet increasing demands of social and legal compliance
- lead church community in being open to God's leading

Through the work of the Pastoral Leadership Team during 2014, a new Pastoral Leader coming to a BUV church can now expect to be:



invited by the church's Regional Pastor to a coffee or meal so that the pastor's own unique story can be heard and specific needs addressed.



included in our BUV Orientation Conference in February to experience the range of people, support services and expertise available to assist pastor and church in developing healthy, fruitful, missional ministry.



invited, along with their partner, to the twice yearly Nourish events as part of our BUV Gathering – a safe place where pastoral couples and individuals can be honest about their journey and experiences, and nourished in body, mind and spirit.



connected to a local pastoral cluster which can become an environment of mutual friendship, support, accountability and growth

- A Pastor in a rural or regional setting will be invited, along with their spouse, to a Rural Ministry Fellowship conference which embraces hospitality, mutual support and ministry, as well as missional development.
- A Youth Pastor will be invited to engage with a mentor as part of the Next Gen Leadership (NGL) mentoring network and attend NGL training days and prayer retreat.
- A Senior Pastor who leads a pastoral team will be invited to join the Senior Pastors Network which meets 3 to 4 times a year to develop collegiality and continued growth.
- A Pastor from a Language Other Than English (LOTE) background will be invited to engage with the Multicultural Ministry Group and to attend the Multicultural Ministers Retreat as well as receive personal support from the BUV's Multicultural Consultant & Pastor and Multicultural Inclusion Worker.
- A Pastor who becomes a candidate for Ordination would be welcomed into a process of discernment and formation that builds on the experience and learning they already have, and invests in their ongoing support and growth
- BUV Retired Pastors receive support from the BUV's Retired Pastors Group.

Our Church Health Team in 2014 helped grow 80 BUV churches to become more:

- Prayerfully dependent upon God in life and mission
- Engaged in partnering together in advancing the Kingdom of God
- Prepared to have challenging conversations to resolve conflicts
- Structured to facilitate effectiveness in governance and mission
- Empowering of leaders, including younger ones, to use their gifts in service
- Aware of a fresh vision of what God is calling them to do and become
- Able to identify their strengths, values and opportunities and express these in new ways
- Generous in the stewardship of their properties and finances
- Ethical and respectful in their treatment of people, particularly those who are vulnerable
- Reflective of the growing cultural and linguistic diversity of the communities around them

The majority of the Church Health Teams' work is on the ground with Pastors and Leaders in Churches throughout Victoria. During 2014, with 1/3 of churches supported by the team having a primary language other than English, the Church Health Team engaged an additional Multicultural Inclusion Worker. The complexities of legal and social requirements of churches also led to the strengthening of our Professional Standards Group.

A range of resources and events for churches were developed and provided during 2014:

- Video series on working with the National Church Life Survey data
- Guide to considering mergers or partnerships
- Church Review and Strategic Planning tool
- Workshops to train leaders in various aspects of church life
- Capacity building groups for both young and interim Pastors
- Training building on the Safe Church Awareness Workshops
- Information to churches on changes to laws around reporting abuse, grooming and protecting children

Our BUV Communications team exists to enhance connectedness across our BUV. Evolution and instigation of a range of BUV communications platforms during 2014, contributed to greater engagement with people, resources and events, and a growing sense of identity of Victorian Baptists as a movement of missional people who are better together.

# BUV Office Reconciliation Action Plan 2013/2014

#### Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) Development Process

An apology to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples was officially made at the BUV Gathering in March 1998 including a commitment to reconciliation. In August 2007 an inaugural meeting of an Indigenous Action Group was held which became known as Baptist Aboriginal Partnerships (BAPs) and put together a resolution for the Gathering in October 2007. This resolution was subsequently adopted and encouraged every Baptist congregation to commit to taking practical steps to grow in understanding and in relationship with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians. In June 2009, members of BAPs approached the BUV Director of Ministries suggesting that a Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) be developed. In 2011 the BUV executive affirmed undertaking a RAP and a statement of Commitment was signed. A restructure of the BUV was taking place at this time and the RAP was put on hold with the changing of key staff and champions. In 2012 the RAP was handed to the BUV public issues group to follow up and a working group was created. In 2013 a new Statement of Commitment was signed by the Director of Mission and Ministries, and the RAP Group established in 2013 undertook a process of connecting and collaborating to develop the BUV Office RAP for 2013/2014.

#### Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) Progress

During the 2 year period of our initial BUV Office RAP we have undertaken the following steps to respect, raise awareness and understanding, and journey in reconciliation:

- Completion and launch of our BUV Office RAP submitted to Reconciliation Australia (Sep 2013)
- Purchase and use of 'Waters of Baptism' artwork by indigenous artist, as our BUV reconciliation imagery
- Development of a 'RAP Kit' provided to all BUV Churches with a view to resourcing them to produce their own local church Reconciliation Action Plan (October 2013 – May 2014)
- Provision of major sponsor support to SURRENDER conference (March 2013/2014 ongoing)
- Inclusion of 'acknowledgement of country' at all BUV events and in event literature
- Promotion of National Reconciliation Week and NAIDOC Week via BUV communication platforms (2013/2014)
- BUV Office Staff training and cultural experience day at Narana Creations (July 2014)
- Ongoing consultation in development of our 2015/2016 RAP




#### The Year 2014 in Numbers

In 2014 our total operating revenue was \$6,853,167 (2013: \$4,518,822) which was an increase of \$2,334,345 over 2013 revenue. In 2014 we disbursed \$4,357,230 (2013: \$5,096,568) resulting in a surplus of revenue over expenditure for the year of \$2,495,937 (2013: shortfall of \$577,746).

The increase in revenue is mainly due to the receipt of \$2,866,000 of trust funds, of which the majority of this amount related to properties of two churches that dissolved during the year. This revenue increase is offset by a decrease of \$486,614 for an investment in a collateralised debt obligation, received in 2013. The decrease in expenditure is mainly due to a once-off grant of \$600,000 paid in 2013, not repeated in 2014.

The net asset position of the Union was affected positively by the receipt of the trust funds and properties from churches that dissolved and resulted in an increase in net assets (2014: \$45,322,339 compared to 2013: \$42,833,128).

#### Governance

Ultimate responsibility for the governance of our Baptist Union of Victoria rests with our Union Council, elected by members of Assembly at our Delegates Dinner.

Our Union Council is comprised of six independent, non-executive Council members as well as the Director of Mission & Ministries, Honorary Legal Advisor and Union Secretary. The Council members have a broad range of business, institutional and governance experience. They apply judgment and accountability standards to ensure that the work of the Council and of our BUV Office results in the greatest possible impact on constituent churches who are members of our Union.

Union Council expects the organisation as a whole, every member, partner and employee, to conduct themselves with the highest ethical standards, and has adopted a formal Council Charter and a set of Council Policies which detail the Council's role, powers, duties and functions. In addition to the matters required by law, the Council is responsible for:

- Setting the strategic direction for the organisation, assessing progress towards strategic objectives and approving policies to work towards those objectives;
- Recommending the appointment of the Director of Mission & Ministries to the Assembly;
- Approving the remuneration and tracking performance of the Director of Mission & Ministries;
- Approving the annual budget;
- Considering and approving strategies and policies to ensure appropriate risk management;
- Monitoring and receiving advice on areas of operational opportunities and financial risk;
- Ensuring compliance with laws and policies; and
- Appointing sub-committees to assist in effective governance.

The Director of Mission & Ministries is responsible for operational management, with all powers, discretions and delegations authorised, from time to time, by the Council. Union Council is responsible for regularly reviewing and ensuring that all necessary and appropriate delegations are in place to enable the Director of Mission & Ministries and the Leadership Team to meet this responsibility.
